Child Care Challenges Facing Families in the Capital Area

Economic development officials, child care providers, and other community members in Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham Counties have joined forces to address the current child care crisis and develop a regional action plan that meets the needs and preferences of working families. The information presented below details findings from secondary research and a survey exploring the challenges 166 parents and caregivers of young children face in the capital area.

Families' Top Child Care Needs Reflect the Region's **Child Care Gap**

78% Weekday care **67%** Full-day care **63%** Care during daytime hours (6:00 AM-6:00 PM)

Parents Are Facing Barriers to Accessing Child Care

80% Cost of care 72% Open spots available 46% Quality of care

Child Care Is a Challenge for All Families, but Households Making Less than \$50,000 Annually Face Different Barriers

95% Cost of care 70% Open spots available

60% Finding care that matches their work schedule 55% Dependability of care

Families making less than \$50,000 annually are also much less likely to have access to the care they need.



Survey respondents with children under the age of 2 and making less than \$50,000 annually are spending 21% or more of their income on child care costs.





I wish there were subsidies for people who make a little too much annually [to qualify for existing supports]."

I struggle to know all the options—we don't know how any of this daycare stuff works. [It feels like] there is so much information about babies but then you are left to navigate the child care system on your own."

The top employment impacts cited by survey respondents included:




Job attendance (missing work, arriving late, leaving early, etc.)
